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




Samuel Sharp (1709-1788) was an English surgeon and author who apprenticed as a surgeon with William Cheselden and is believed to have had a hand in the preparation of the latter's great work, the Osteographia (1733). Sharp had an extensive practice, was elected to the Royal Societies of London and Paris, was a personal friend of Voltaire, and is credited with having introduced improvements in several surgical instruments. The present account of his winter tour through Italy in 1765-66 for health reasons, found some favour with Samuel Johnson, but embroiled Sharp in a literary controversy with Joseph Baretti, one of the best know Italian literati of his day. "One of the most outspoken and critical accounts of Italian life to be published in England in the eighteenth century, presenting a thoroughly jaundiced view of the country, but not mere invective. It was this work which provoked Baretti's Account of the Manners and Customs of Italy, 1768" (Pine-Coffin).




'Giuseppe Marc'Antonio Baretti was an Italian writer, translator, poet and literary critic born in Turin, who spent many years living in London, where he was often known as Joseph Baretti.He came to London in 1751 and became acquainted with members of the literary and artistic establishment, such as Samuel Johnson, David Garrick, Henry Fielding and Sir Joshua Reynolds (who painted Baretti's portrait). He was appointed the first Secretary of Foreign Correspondence to the Royal Academy of Arts in 1769. (RA)

In this work, Baretti attempted to correct the mistakes that English travellers have committed when writing about Italy. Baretti particularly had in mind Samuel Sharp's 1766 work Letters from Italy. As he writes in the preface to this work, his objective is to make young travellers 'sensible... of the errors they are led into, and to point out to them some object of inquiry more worthy of the curiosity of sensible persons, and caution them against being too ready to condemn every thing but what they have seen practised at home' (viii).


The present work is the first English translation of Grosley's Observations on Italy, originally published in French in 1764. In the translator's preface, Nugent states that Grosley disguised his authorship when his book was first published as being written by 'two Swedish gentlemen', possibly to avoid a French readership's bias towards travel writers who shared their nationality: 'For France it is a received and perhaps a just opinion, that foreign travellers are generally more attentive, more patient and less superficial than the French, and withal more judicious and impartial in their observations' (p. v). Nugent also praises Grosley's deep dive into the history, geography and arts of the places he is describing; as well as his careful attention to the inhabitants of each place (hence the book's title), which makes him stand out above other travel writers in Nugent's eyes.



Minor loss to margin of title-page, light toning and occasional light spotting. Extensive ink annotations in a contemporary hand along with pencil annotations in a later hand up until p.139.

The translator Johann Reinhold Forster (1729–1798) was a Reformed Calvinist pastor and naturalist of partially Scottish descent who made contributions to the early ornithology of Europe and North America. In 1772 he was engaged as naturalist on James Cook's second circumnavigation of the globe in the Resolution, which took him round the Cape of Good Hope to New Zealand, Tahiti, Tonga, and south beyond the Antarctic circle, a voyage which he references in the dedication to Thomas Falconer in the present work: "Dear Sir, When this reaches you, I shall probably be on the opposite hemisphere of our globe: but though at such a distance I shall never forget that early friendship you honoured me with, when I was taken notice of but by very few".

Johann Hermann von Riedesel (1740-1785) studied jurisprudence at Erlangen, and visited France in 1761, Italy in 1762 and 1767, and unlike most Grand Tourists, made the decision to travel south of Naples and on to Sicily. He then travelled in Greece, the Levant, Spain, Portugal, England, Holland and France during the years 1768 and 1769. Shortly thereafter he took up diplomacy as a career. From 1772 to 1778 he was Prussian envoy and minister in Vienna, Vienna, and in 1779 he was the representative of Frederick the Great at the Congress of Teschen.


Dominique Vivant, Baron Denon (1747-1825) was a French artist, writer, diplomat, author, archaeologist, and a diplomat for France under Louis XV and Louis XVI. He was appointed as the first Director of the Louvre museum by Napoleon after the Egyptian campaign of 1798–1801, and is commemorated in the Denon Wing of the modern museum and in the Dominique-Vivant Denon Research Center. His two-volume Voyage dans la basse et la haute Egypte ("Journey in Lower and Upper Egypt"), 1802, was foundational for modern Egyptology.

Denon travelled twice to Malta in the second half of the 18th century, wrote the accounts of his visits in the books: *Voyage en Sicile*, (1st edition, 1788), and *Voyage dans la Basse et la Haute Egypte*. In 1778, Denon was secretary at the French Embassy in Naples. That year he went on a cultural tour to southern Italy and then Malta. His description of Valletta is an anthology piece and his observations on the frescoes of Mattia Preti are among the earliest we have by an expert artist. He was moved on seeing peasants toiling endlessly on their barren island. In 1798, Denon set sail with the fleet that was to invade Egypt. There he was going to make some one thousand drawings of the monuments of the Pharoahs. He describes the capture of Malta by Bonaparte and then attends a dinner given by the General during which he has the opportunity to see the newly appointed Maltese administrators. Denon believed that Malta could become useful to the agricultural sector of the French economy, postulating that tropical plants could be acclimatised on the island before they were grown in Provence.

Hester Lynch Piozzi, née Salusbury (1740-1821) was a Welsh-born diarist, author and patron of the arts, and is an important source of information on Samuel Johnson and 18th-century English life. Hester Lynch and her husband Henry Thrale, then a music teacher, counted Samuel Johnson as a close friend and regular visitor. After her husband's death in 1781, Hester Lynch married his daughter's music master, an Italian named Gabriel Piozzi, and went away with him to Italy, a departure which earned Johnson's open disapproval. After Johnson's death, Piozzi published the Anecdotes of the Late Samuel Johnson (1786), as well as a compilations of her letters with Johnson. Her account of Johnson shows a different and more compassionate side of the author than does Boswell's Life (Encyclopaedia Britannica).

The present work was published after Hester Lynch married Piozzi, and it includes accounts of her travels in Europe. Most of Hester Lynch's friends deserted her after her marriage to Piozzi, a fact which she addresses in the Preface to this work: "For the book—I have not thrown my thoughts into the form of private letters; because a work of which truth is the best recommendation, should not above all others begin with a lie. My old acquaintance rather chose to amuse themselves with conjectures, than to flatter me with tender inquiries during my absence: our correspondence then would not have been any amusement to the Public..." (pp. vi-vii). In the preface, Hester Lynch also identifies herself with King Lear, claiming to be 'More sinn'd against, than sinning'.

Scion of an old Catholic family, Henry Swinburne (1743-1803) was educated "at the monastic seminary at Lacelle, France, the University of Paris, Bordeaux, and finally the Royal Academy in Turin" (ODNB). By 1763 he had inherited the family estates following the death of his older brother, and now financially independent, he married and settled in Hamsterley, Durham, before returning to Europe. In 1775 Swinburne toured Spain with fellow Catholic Sir Thomas Gascoigne (an account of which was published in 1779), before sailing to Italy. From 1777 until early 1779 he toured the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, which the present work, first published 1783-1785, recounts. John Ingamells describes it as "a comprehensive history and travel guide" (A Dictionary of British and Irish Travellers in Italy).

Sir Richard Vanden-Bempde-Johnstone, 1st Baronet (21 September 1732 – 14 July 1807) was a British Member of Parliament.



John 'Warwick' Smith lived and worked in Italy from 1776-1781 under the patronage of the Earl of Warwick. He was a leading member of the Watercolour Society and was elected its president in 1814. 'His Italian pictures, which he continued to produce for many years after his return to England, are considered Smith's best' (ODNB).


James Merigot (1760-1824) was a French engraver and publisher. "He is best known for his engraved reproductions of John Warwick Smith's watercolors to illustrate Views of the Lakes of Cumberland, as well as A Select Collection of Views and Ruins in Roma and Its Vicinity, which he executed from his own sketches drawn en plein air. Of note with regards to the latter portfolio, Merigot popularized Italy's historic ruins as interest in Neo-Classical arts was on the rise in Britain. He also wrote and published a manual for amateur artists" (Annex Galleries).





The second edition of the English botanist James Edward Smith's (1759-1828) account of his 1786-87 tour of Holland, France, Italy, and Switzerland originally published in 1793. "Smith visited Allamand and Van Royen at Leyden, the widow of Rousseau (for whom, as a botanist of the Linnaean school, he had a great admiration), Broussonet at Montpellier, Gerard at Cottignac, the Marquis Durazzo at Genoa, Masacagni the anatomist at Sienna, Sir William Hamilton and the Duke of Gloucester at Naples, Bonnet, De Saussure and others at Geneva, La Chenal at Basle, and Herman at Strasburg. At the same time he carefully examined the picture galleries, the herbaria, and botanical libraries en route" (DNB).




The author William Hanson was killed in action with the French cavalry in Catalonia during the Peninsular Campaign of the Napoleonic Wars in 1813.




Originally appeared in Ackermann's Repository during 1809-1813 under the title Letters From Italy, this the first edition in book form with plates. "The following Letters having been successively inserted in 'Ackermann's Repository of Arts', under the title 'Letters from Italy', the proprietor of that Miscellany, influenced, perhaps, by the opinion of partial judges, felt desirous of publishing them in a separate Volume. To this wish alone they owe their appearance in the present form, the Author being too conscious of the imperfections in his performance to have of his own accord presumed to usher it into a more extensive circulation, even with all the advantages of embellishment which it has derived from the exertions of the Publisher" (Preface).






John Chetwode Eustace (c.1762–1815) was an Anglo-Irish Catholic priest and antiquary. His "Classical Tour" documents Eustace's 1801-1802 journey to Italy as a tutor and companion to three of his pupils. The work was first published in 1813 whereupon he attained sudden celebrity, becoming a prominent figure in literary society. The work would go through eight editions between 1813 and 1841, becoming a standard handbook for classical tourists. A short tour in France, in 1814, led to his "Letter from Paris", and in 1815 he travelled again to Italy to collect fresh materials, but he was seized with malaria at Naples and died there.


"The work presents a reasonable and well balanced account of all aspects of Italian life, though the author, who was a Catholic priest, is said to have repented later of some of his more liberal expressions of opinion" (Pine-Coffin).



First published 1813, this edition the first to include the 10pp. introductory portrait of the author by his brother Isaac.

Joseph Forsyth (1763–1815) was writer on Italy, born at Elgin, Scotland. During the peace of Amiens he travelled to Italy, where he would spend the next eighteen months frequenting the literary circles of various Italian cities. He was well read in Italian history, literature, and architecture and had a keen eye. Forsyth was at Turin on his way home when war was renewed, and on 25 May 1803 he was arrested and imprisoned at Nîmes. Caught trying to escape, he was marched in midwinter 600 miles to Fort de Bitché, in north-east France, where his confinement was at first strict. It was, however, gradually relaxed; after two years he was moved to Verdun, where he remained for five years. In 1811 he was briefly permitted to reside in Paris but four months later had to return to detention, this time at Valenciennes. He spent his time studying Italian literature and art, and, hoping to secure his release by appealing to Napoleon as a patron of the arts, he wrote Remarks on Antiquities, Arts, and Letters, during an Excursion in Italy, first published in 1813. The book failed in its practical objective and he was not freed until the allies entered Paris in March 1814 (ODNB).

"It was at once recognised as one of the most valuable contemporary contributions to the understanding of Italy. The third and fourth editions contain a short memoir of the author by his brother Isaac, and this appears also in some copies of the second edition" (Pine-Coffin).

Sir Richard Colt Hoare (1758–1838) was a landowner and antiquary who, after losing both his wife and his career, travelled extensively throughout Europe, where he visited all the classical sites and immersed himself in the landscape, all the time drawing, recording, and collecting for his house and portfolio. His copious notes and journals, which chronicle his travels, were written up later in Recollections Abroad: Journals of Tours on the Continent 1819). After a brief return home Colt Hoare resumed his travels in 1788, 'no longer as a tourist but as a systematic antiquarian...quitting...the road for the path, the capital for the provinces' (A Classical Tour). He passed through the Netherlands, Germany, Venice, and Florence and finally settled in Siena. He sought to locate the major sites of the Étruscan civilisation, then explored the Appian way with his sketchbook and returned south in order to visit the recently publicised Greek ruins at Paestum and those in Sicily (ODNB).




Eastlake had arrived in Rome in 1816, and remained there for fourteen years. After preparing the illustrations for this book, he made eight paintings of brigands which were exhibited in London at the British Institution in 1823-5. They proved a popular subject. Some were afterwards engraved in mezzotint, and some formed the basis of the stage-designs for Planché's play, The Brigand (1829). Eastlake's first paintings exhibited at the Royal Academy (1823) were also views of Rome.


'James Hakewill (1778–1843), architectural draughtsman, was born on 25 November 1778, the second son in the family of eight surviving children of John Hakewill (1742–1791), landscape and portrait painter, and decorator, and his wife, Anna Maria Cook (1747–1818). The architect Henry Hakewill (1771–1830) was his brother. He was trained as an architect and entered the Royal Academy Schools in 1807, from which date he became a regular exhibitor there. The same year he married Marie Catherine, daughter of W. Browne of Green Street, Grosvenor Square, London. She was a portrait painter and frequent exhibitor at the Royal Academy and the Society of Arts. They had four sons, the youngest of whom were Frederick Charles Hakewill, a portrait painter, and Richard Wentworth Hakewill.

James Hakewill is chiefly known for his architectural publications. In 1813 he published The History of Windsor and its Neighbourhood, illustrated with engravings from his own drawings. In 1816–17 he travelled in Italy, and on his return published A Picturesque Tour of Italy (1818–20), his bestknown work, illustrated with plates engraved from watercolours painted by J. M. W. Turner, based on sketches by Hakewill. After a visit to Jamaica, Hakewill published A Picturesque Tour in the Island of Jamaica (1825), from his own drawings. Other works included Plans, sections, and elevations of the abattoirs in Paris, with considerations for their adoption in London (1828) and An Attempt to Determine the Exact Character of Elizabethan Architecture (1835). At the end of his life he worked on drawings for a book on the Rhine, to be a companion volume to Italy, but this was not completed.' (DNB)

\*Frederic Clay Bartlett was an American artist and art collector know for his his collection of French post-Impressionist and modernist art. He was also a founding member of the Arts Club of Chicago, an association with promoted modern art. In 1902 he moved into Dorfred House, his new home in Chicago, named after a combination of his and his wife's names (Dora and Fred).







"Lady Morgan's Italy was at once one of the most comprehensive and most controversial works on Italy published at this time. Some journals, unwilling to lose Colburn's advertisements, were silent or non-commital. Others, representing the liberal tendencies of the author (described by W.H. Dixon as 'Lady Morgan's eloquent lamentation and description of the change for the worse that had come over everything' since the French withdrew from Italy) produced bitterly scathing reviews. The Quarterly Review for July 1821 was particularly acid. On the other hand Byron, writing to Murray on 24 Aug. 1821, calls it 'a really excellent book'" (Pine-Coffin).



The Gentleman's Magazine (July, 1834) commented, on the release of the first book: "The great charm of this work must be considered to exist in the masterly sketches of Mr. Roberts, who has piled up his towering battlements and frowning castles, amid the wild and lofty mountains that rise to guard them; or detailed to us with a rich and curious pencil, the fine arabesque courts, halls, and gateways and galleries, the marble fountains and colonnades, the rich capitals, the fretted domes, and elaborate ceilings, which even now, beautiful in their decay, give a melancholy assurance of their former surpassing loveliness and grandeur. We have no hesitation in pronouncing this to be one of the most beautiful Annuals".





An account of Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley's (1797-1851) travels in Italy, in Como and Milan in 1840, and Northern Italy, Florence, Rome, and Naples in 1842-43. The present work (Shelley's last published book) is as much a travel account as it is an exploration of her own body and psyche. She deals with her deteriorating health as she describes the scenery of Italy, and the work is marked by the grief from having lost her husband and two of her children. The work also takes a political standpoint, attempting to arouse sympathy among English readers for the "Young Italy" movement which fought for Italian independence and unification. One example of Shelley's mix of travel writing with an exploration of her own life can be seen in this passage, from the first volume:

"To me, indeed, there was something even thrilling and affecting in the aspect of the commonest objects around... Window-curtains, the very wash-hand stands, they were all such as had been familiar to me in Italy long, long ago. I had not seen them since those young and happy days. Strange and indescribable emotions invaded me; recollections, long forgotten, arose fresh and strong by mere force of association, produced by those objects being presented to my eye, inspiring a mixture of pleasure and pain, almost amounting to agony" (I, 60-1).

A unique travel book which provides insight into the last years of one of the greatest female authors of the 19th Century.







During his stay in Paris in 1839 he was taught the daguerreotype process, which fascinated him. Naya settled in Venice in 1857, where he set up a photographic studio. For several years he collaborated closely with photographer Carlo Ponti but in 1868 he founded his own studio. During his long career, Naya photographed every aspect of the city of Venice. His views of the palaces on the Grand Canal, and his panoramas of the city give a complete picture of Venice's architecture in the mid-nineteenth century.





Freed by a large inheritance in 1763, Henry Swinburne (1743-1803) spent much of his life in travelling. In the present work "an exact investigation of the soil, cultivation, government, commerce, and manners of Spain, was to be the grand primary object; but what I was more confident of my strength in, and what I own I found more suitable to my inclinations, was the study of its antiquities, especially the Moorish. The travels through Spain that have appeared in print, are either old and obsolete, consequently in many respects unfit to convey a proper idea of its present state" (Preface). Swinburne's publications have been commended for their "simplicity and the lack of affectation" and it has been noted that "he was one of the first to relish travel for its own sake" (ODNB). His direct narrative is much enhanced by plates which are particularly noteworthy for the excellence and accuracy of architectural detail, half of them having been etched by Swinburne himself.



In April 1810 George Cockburn (1763–1847) was appointed to the command of a division in the army of occupation in Sicily, and took charge of Messina, but his period of command was short, and in November, on his promotion to lieutenant-general, he had to resign. Cockburn then travelled in Sicily, and on his return to England published two illustrated volumes called A Voyage to Cadiz and Gibraltar up the Mediterranean to Sicily and Malta... On leaving Sicily, Cockburn settled down at Shanganah Castle, near Bray, co. Wicklow, which he had purchased, and began to devote himself to politics. He was initially a radical reformer and admirer of Cobbett, and erected a column in his grounds in memory of the Reform Bill. Cockburn was knighted in 1821 (DNB).

Étienne Eugène Cicéri (1813-1890) was a was a French painter, illustrator, engraver and theatrical designer. Born at the end of Napoleon's reign, Ciceri spent his formative years in an extended family of painters. His father, Pierre Luc Charles Ciceri (1782-1868), painted grand decorative murals and stage sets, and served as the designer of official ceremonies following the Restoration of Louis XVIII in 1814. The present work is one of his most popular albums, and was derived from trips he made to the Alps and the Pyrénées. He later participated in illustrating the travel writings of Baron Taylor and Charles Nodier, collected as Voyages pittoresques et romantiques dans l'ancienne France, featuring views of Brittany. His works are on display in public collections throughout the Europe and the United States, including the Louvre, the National Gallery in Berlin, the Getty Museum in Los Angeles and the French national museums at Châlons-sur-Marne, Chartres, Le Harve, Limoges, Mulhouse, Perpignan, and Troyes.





The Alhambra, built for the last Muslim emirs in Spain, is a palace and fortress complex located in Granada, Andalusia. Originally constructed as a small fortress in 889, it was rebuilt and renovated in the mid-13th century by Mohammed ben Al-Ahmar, the first king of the Nasrid dynasty which became the last Islamic sultanate on the Iberian Peninsula. The complex was designated a royal palace in 1333 under Yusuf I, Sultan of Granada. After centuries of disrepair, it was rediscovered in the 19th century by European scholars and travellers. The early photographs in this album therefore depict the Alhambra shortly after its rediscovery. Included are photographs of many of its major buildings, including the Hall of the Ambassadors, the Court of the Lions and fountain, and the Generalife.

Inscribed in pencil on the front end-paper by the compiler of the album is the following:

"The Alhambra/ The principal building was commenced by Hon-l-ahmar in 1248/ He everywhere introduces his motto: Wa la ghalib illa Al-lah/ ("There is no conqueror but God")".







He was accompanied by the artist Claude Aubriet and the doctor Gundelsheimer. Pitton de Tournefort travelled extensively in the Archipelago, visiting most of the Cyclades (Andros, Tinos, Delos, Santorini, etc.) and many in the Northern Sporades (Samos, Mitylene, Skyros, Tenedos). He also spent a considerable period in Crete before going to Constantinople and Asia Minor, the coasts of the Black Sea and then overland through Armenia to Persia. The travellers returned to Paris in June 1702. Pitton de Tournefort began to prepare his manuscript for publication but his health failed after the printing of vol. I and he died in 1708, before vol. 2 was ready for the press. According to the preface the unknown editor kept back vol. I until vol. 2 appeared in 1717, and the two were published together. The text takes the form of letters to M. de Pontchartrain, who sponsored Pitton's mission. The very fine plates are after Aubriet's drawings, and illustrate costumes, botanical and zoological specimens, views and maps...Many of Aubriet's drawings are now in the Bibliothèque Nationale and in the State and University Library of Göttingen" (Blackmer).



According to the BLC the name Habesci is a pseudonym. It is certainly not a Greek name, whereas the name Ghiga calls to mind the well-known Fanariot family Ghika, and it was among the Fanariots that Turkish government officials were recruited. The work itself is very interesting, especially the last seven chapters which contain accounts of commerce between Turkey and various European countries" (Blackmer).

Hughes and Parker arrived in Preveza late in 1813; they were joined on their Albanian tour by C.R. Cockerell, who spent about two months with them. Most of the book is in fact devoted to a description of this part of their travels, and 10 of the 12 engravings are after drawings by Cockerell illustrating sites in Epirus. This work is one of the major sources of information about Ali Pasha. Hughes was a confirmed philhellene. He was one of the early members of the Philmuse Society, probably subscribing when he was in Athens in 1814, and later he became a member of the London Greek Committee. The massacre of the Greeks of Chios Island in 1822 provoked his Address to the People of England in the Cause of the Greeks, 1822 which was violently anti-Turkish and aroused considerable controversy...Hughes' Travels also contains a 'Dissertation on Dodona and Delphi' by Samuel Butler, headmaster of Shrewsbury School when Hughes was a student there and the author of Atlas of Ancient Geography" (Blackmer).



"This work is the first and probably the best of all Pouqueville's books on Greece. Pouqueville had joined the French expedition to Egypt as a medical man attached to the scientific commission. On his return to Italy in 1798 he was captured by privateers who landed him at Navarino. He was imprisoned at Tripolis for ten months and later was taken to Constantinople and confined to the prison of the Seven Towers for two years. Although officially a prisoner of war he was able to move about during his stay at Tripolis; he

studied modern Greek and, mingling with the Greeks, was able to make notes of his observations. He returned to France in 1801, produced his medical thesis on the plague, and wrote up this account of his experiences in the Levant. The book attracted a good deal of attention; possibly the dedication to Napoleon helped. In 1805, as a result, Pouqueville was appointed French agent at loannina. The work contains a great deal of information on popular customs, superstitions, songs etc. 'Whether original or not, Pouqueville gives us the best picture of the Romaioi, as he calls them' (-Malakis)'' (Blackmer).

They reached Zakynthos early in 1812 and proceeded to Athens and on to Asia Minor, stopping at Samos to visit the temple of Juno. Plagued at various places prevented the examination of some of the sites on their program, but a tremendous amount of work was accomplished. On their return to Athens at the end of 1812 they examined the many remains of antiquity in Attica. This material alone was sufficient for a volume, and the work was put in hand immediately, to avoid plagiarism" (Blackmer).

"This panorama accompanied the text of Acland's brief 48-page description of Troy: The Plains of Troy. Illustrated with a panoramic drawing taken on the spot; and a map, Oxford, W. Baker, 1839. Acland, who later became regius professor of medicine at Oxford, spent the years 1838-9 abroad for his health, most of that time as a guest on board H.M.S. Pembroke cruising the Mediterranean. It was then that he visited the Levant and the coast of Asia Minor; in fact he made three visits to the Troad in 1838. A long review of Acland's work appeared in the Quarterly Review, 1840 (vol. 66, pp. 355-74); it was highly praised by the anonymous reviewer who regrets that Acland did not publish the whole of his journal. Acland had intended to write a full-length work on Troy but he published only this panorama, with a description and a short account of the circumstances of its production; he also produced sketches of all the seven churches of Asia Minor. At the end of his text Acland acknowledges the help of Sir Francis Beaufort and mentions that the work was going to begin on a survey of the northern coast of Asia Minor, a reference to Spratt and Graves's survey of 1839. The panorama accompanied the brief pamphlet, but it was sold separately by Wyatt, publisher's of engravings and lithographs, as is clear from Wyatt's bill, which makes no mention of the text published by Baxter. The map, which is bound into the British Library copy of the text, was also printed by Wyatt. Acland's unpublished and copious journal is preserved in the Bodleian Library' (Atabey).

This is one of the few accounts of brigandage suffered by a Greek. Most published accounts refer to foreign victims" (Blackmer).


"The first serious treatise on aerostation as a practical possibility" (PMM).

In June of 1783, the Montgolfier brothers successfully launched a balloon over Annonay, marking the beginning of the history of flight. This was surpassed in September when they sent up another balloon, this time carrying a sheep, a cock and a duck. Even more sensational was the flight of November 21, in which Pilâtre de Rozier, accompanied by the Marquis d'Arlandes, embarked from the Château de la Muette in the Bois de Bologne and flew for five and a half miles across Paris - the first aerial voyage in history. The experiment, which was witnessed by the Dauphin and Benjamin Franklin, was an event of the highest importance. On December 1, 1783, J.A.C. Charles made a much longer ascent in a hydrogen balloon of his own invention, and stayed aloft for two hours. These aerial voyages and more are described in these volumes.

It was followed in 1805 by A Northern Summer: or, Travels round the Baltic, through Denmark, Sweden, Russia, Prussia and Part of Germany In The Year 1804; in 1806 by The Stranger in Ireland, or a Tour in the Southern and Western parts of that country in 1805, and in 1807 by A Tour through Holland, along the right and left banks of the Rhine, to the south of Germany, in 1806. Lord Byron, who met Carr in Cadiz, "refers to him in some suppressed stanzas of canto 1 of Childe Harolde as 'Green Erin's knight and Europe's wandering star'" (ODNB). Abbey speculates that the plates in The Stranger in France are by William Daniell.

"Carr was knighted by the Duke of Bedford, Viceroy of Ireland, in 1806, the year of the publication of The Stranger in Ireland. This latter book drew down upon it Dubois's skit My Pocket Book, or Hints for a Ryghte Merrie and Conceited Tour. Byron pilloried Carr in a cancelled passage of English Bards and Scotch Reviewers, and, it is said, begged, when he met Carr abroad, not to be put down on paper" (Abbey).

The author and journalist John Scott (1784-1821) was a friend or associate of many writers of his period, including Byron (his schoolfriend), Leigh Hunt, Hazlitt, and Wordsworth, edited a number of radical and liberal journals, including The Statesman, The Censor, and Drakard's Stamford News, and was also the owner of Drakard's Paper (later renamed The Champion).

In October 1814 Scott visited Paris for the first time and afterwards recorded his impressions in A Visit to Paris in 1814 (1815). After Waterloo, Scott took the opportunity of revisiting the French capital via the battlefield and Brussels. The events of 1815 prompted Scott to revise the work, and the second edition recorded the "change of the political situation of France...caused by the return of Buonaparte from Elba, and the expulsion of the Bourbons from the nation. The three months that have carried off the First Edition of the 'VISIT,' have both commenced and concluded the second reign of 'the Emperor'" (p. iii). Consequently, the author expanded his preface with further observations on the most recent events, and 'an amusing Journal, kept by a friend of mine, who was in Paris during the whole of the duration of Buonaparte's second reign' (p. xvii). The journal reports, among other things, Napoleon's abdication, and how, on 8th July, 'I saw Buonaparte make his last entry, – and the contrast between the cry of a small but fierce faction composed of mere mob and military, and the shout of a redeemed and rejoicing people, has made an impression on my mind never to be effaced' (p. lxiv). A third edition appeared in 1815, followed by a fourth in 1816, (the same year in which Scott published a sequel, Paris Revisited, which reached a third edition in the same year); together, these various editions of the two works earned Scott a reputation as "one of the best known commentators on post-Napoleonic Paris" (Colbert, p. 15).

The author and journalist John Scott (1784-1821) was a friend or associate of many writers of his period, including Byron (his schoolfriend), Leigh Hunt, Hazlitt, and Wordsworth, edited a number of radical and liberal journals, including The Statesman, The Censor, and Drakard's Stamford News, and was also the owner of Drakard's Paper (later renamed The Champion). In October 1814 he visited Paris for the first time and afterwards recorded his impressions in A Visit to Paris in 1814 (1815). He sent a copy of this work to Wordsworth and, while visiting B. R. Haydon in his studio in April 1815 met the poet, who was sitting for his cast. The two men became close friends. The present work, Paris Revisited in 1815, a sequel to his earlier work, appeared in 1816 and was widely acclaimed. Reginald Heber considered Scott 'the ablest of the weekly journalists' and an excellent 'French tourist' (Heber, 2.432). Walter Scott was an admirer too, and William Beckford made four pages of notes on the two works.


Scott later worked as the editor of the projected London Magazine, which was to be a monthly miscellary with a pronounced literary bias and, in its political liberalism, an antidote to the rabid toryism of Blackwood's Magazine, which was edited in Edinburgh by J. G. Lockhart and John Wilson. In May 1820 appeared the first of Scott's many attacks on the writings of Z in Blackwood's, whose venom had been directed at the 'cockney school' of Keats, Cornelius Webbe, Hazlitt, and Leigh Hunt. He successfully provoked Lockhart, the main object of his assaults, into branding him a 'liar and a scoundrel, but a physical confrontation was averted until February 1821, when a provocative statement from Jonathan Henry Christie, Lockhart's agent in London, was interpreted by Scott as a slur on his character. Christie was challenged to a duel and on 16 February the pair met at Chalk Farm, between Camden Town and Hampstead, at about nine o'clock in the evening. Christie did not fire on the first occasion, but owing to a misunderstanding between the seconds was forced to fire on a second occasion in self-defence. Scott was hit in the lower abdomen and removed to a local tavern, where he lay, attended by family and friends, until his death in the evening of 27 February (ODNB).

'Helen Maria Williams (1759-1827) was a British poet, novelist, essayist, and translator known for her support of radical causes, such as abolitionism and the French Revolution. Born in London, Williams was educated by her mother and began publishing her poetry and essays with the help of her mentor, Dr. Andrew Kippis. Ardently political, one of Williams's first works, An Ode on the Peace, celebrated the end of the American Revolution.

Once Williams had allied herself with the Girondists, she moved to Paris and primarily wrote letters and prose. She also hosted salons, entertaining such philosophers as Mary Wollstonecraft, Francisco de Miranda, and Thomas Paine. Thrown into a Luxembourg prison for her political beliefs, Williams was allowed to write sonnets and work on a series of English translations of French literature, most notably Jacques-Henri Bernardin de Saint-Pierre's novel Paul et Virginie.

Williams was eventually released from prison and fled to Switzerland for a short period before returning to Paris. She continued to write until Napoleon arrested her in 1802 for her poem Ode on the Peace of Amiens. Troubled by Napoleon's imperial ambitions, Williams stopped writing for a period of time. She resumed her literary career in 1815, however, and wrote poems, letters, sketches, some short fiction, and translations until her death'. (Poetry Foundation)

In this work, Williams expounds on her thoughts about the French revolution after her direct involvement in it, and shows her opposition to Napoleon. A work of historical significance and particular interest to collectors of Napoleoniana.



Already well travelled and a natural story-teller, he began writing sketches and curious anecdotes not unlike those in the Sketchbook of Washington Irving, then in Paris. Irving privately found Grattan 'an arrant literary tradesman' and 'a bore' (Írving, Journal, 17 Feb and 17 Nov 1824). But he generously read his work and helped him find a publisher for a collection of his stories which eventually appeared in 1823 under the title Highways and Byways, or, Tales of the Roadside, dedicated to Irving. This made his name and remained his best-known work. French translations soon followed and there were further series in 1825 and 1827 (ODNB).

Ann Radcliffe (1764-1823) published five novels in her lifetime, though she always called them 'romances'. They were *The Castles of Athlin and Dunbayne* (1789); *A Sicilian Romance* (1790); *The Romance of the Forest* (1791); *The Mysteries of Udolpho* (1794); and *The Italian* (1797). Her travel book, *A Journey Made in the Summer of 17914*, appeared in 1795 and is a narrative of her European sojourn in 1794 with her journalist husband William. It began as a picturesque tour through Holland, but as they progressed on to Germany, they found themselves in the midst of the first Franco-Prussian war which began in 1792 and was still raging. A final novel, Gaston de Blondeville, was published posthumously in 1826. Her first romance was barely noticed; the second caused a stir; the third made her famous. At the time of her death in 1823, she was hailed as the 'great enchantress' and the 'Shakespeare of Romance writers' (Miles, 7, 10), and was generally esteemed as one of the pre-eminent novelists of her generation (ODNB).


First published in French in 1773 as Description des glacières de Savoye, and in English in 1775. Marc-Théodore Bourrit (1739–1819) was a genevois traveller, writer, painter, miniature and enamel painter, draughtsman, etcher, natural scientist, journalist, musician, and one of the first to systematically explore and record the Alps and their geological features. His post as precentor of the church of St Peter (the former cathedral) at Geneva allowed him to explore the Alps, for which he had conceived a great passion ever since an ascent (1761) of the Voirons, near Geneva. In 1775 he made the first ascent of the Buet by the now usual route from the Pierre à Bérard. In 1784–1785 he was the first traveller to attempt the ascent of Mont Blanc (not conquered till 1786), but neither then nor later (1788) did he succeed in reaching its summit. On the other hand, he reopened (1787) the route over the Col du Géant, which had fallen into oblivion, and travelled also among the mountains of the Valais and the Bernese Oberland.

The substantial list of subscribers includes such luminaries as Samuel Johnson, Beckford, Burke, Garrick, Reynolds, and Horace and other Walpoles (it is dedicated by the translators to Mrs. R. Walpole).


Frederic Schoberl (1775-1853) was an English journalist, writer, illustrator, translator, editor, who was long associated with Ackermann's Repository of Arts, one of the foremost Regency periodicals. The Picturesque Tour comprises a "connected tour from Geneva through the Valais, over the new road constructed by command of the late ruler of France across the Simplon, to Lake Maggiore, and by the Lake of Como to Milan". Schoberl writes in the preface that "[I]t would be difficult, perhaps impossible, to select another tract of equal extent, in which [one] would find such diversity of scenery, embracing all that is wild, awful and sublime in the polar regions of everlasting ice and snow; all that is beautiful, picturesque and magnificent in the mountains, forests and waters of more temperate regions; and all that is soft, sweet and enchanting in the warmer skies, the kindlier breezes and the more luxuriant nature of southern Europe". The Simplon Pass had become the dominant route through the Alps after Napoleon had a road constructed in 1801-1805 to facilitate the movement of artillery through the mountains, thereby laying the route by which English tourists would later travel to Italy. The literary significance of the region in this period is significant; it is on the banks of Lake Geneva in 1816, for instance, that Lord Byron (quoted on p. 21), Mary Shelley, and Percy Bysshe Shelley had their infamous competition to write the best ghost story, from which the idea for Mary Shelley's Frankenstein was born. The illustrators, Gabriel and Mathias Gabriel Lory, were prominent Swiss landscape painters, whose talents, Schoberl assures the reader, "will be a sufficient pledge for the accuracy and fidelity of the views contained in this volume" (Preface).

Views include Geneva, Sion, Brieg, Simplon, Algaby, Lake Maggiore, Gondo, Isola Bella, Crevola, Sesto, Lake Como, and Milan.

\*According to Tooley, "[C] are should be taken to see that all the plates are dated 1820 as the book was issued later... with the title still dated 1820 but the plates of later dates, and the impressions of these later issues are considerably inferior to the originals" (Tooley, 359). This two-volume work on forest trees, inspired by his New Forest home, was published in 1791. In his dedicatory address to his patron, William Mitford, Gilpin observes that his earlier experiences of the picturesque had been in mountainous or hilly areas; but in his walks and rides in the forest, he had become fascinated by the beauty of trees. In Volume 1 he discusses different forests and tree species, and in Volume 2 specific picturesque locations in the New Forest.



Ireland's Picturesque Views on Warwickshire Avon (included in this set) features plates of Shakespearean interest, such as an engraving of Shakespeare's monument and Shakespeare's house in Stratford.


John Stoddart (1773–1856), was a writer and lawyer, who embraced republicanism and revolutionary France, looked forward to a Napoleonic military victory, and adopted the cropped hairstyle of the sans-culottes. He read for the bar at Gray's Inn, and lodged with Basil Montagu, at whose chambers he became an associate of radicals and literary figures including William Hazlitt and Wordsworth. He took to writing as a source of income, translating from the French of Joseph Despaze The five men, or, A review of the proceedings and principles of the executive directory of France, with the lives of the present members (1797), and from the German, with Georg Heinrich Noehden, two of Schiller's plays, Fiesco (1796) and Don Carlos (1798). By the end of the century Stoddart's republican enthusiasm had waned, and he mixed with nobility on his tour of Scotland, which was the basis for his Remarks on the Local Scenery and Manners of Scotland (1801). In the autumn of 1800, on his return from Scotland, he stayed in the Lake District with Coleridge and Wordsworth, who drew upon passages from Stoddart's book in The Prelude (ODNB).


'Manby, George William (1765–1854), inventor, was born at Denver, near Downham Market, Norfolk, on 28 November 1765, the son of Matthew Pepper Manby, a captain in the Welch fusiliers. Thomas Manby (1769–1834) was his younger brother. He attended a school at Downham, kept by Thomas Nooks and William Chatham. He then attended school at Bromley, Kent, studying under Reuben Burrow, then teacher of mathematics in the military drawing-room at the Tower. After a short time he entered the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich, but because of a delay in obtaining a commission in the artillery he joined the Cambridgeshire militia, eventually attaining the rank of captain.

Manby married, in 1793, the only daughter of a Dr Preston, and went to live near Denver, but in 1801 domestic problems caused him to leave home and settle at Clifton, near Bristol. Here he devoted himself to literary pursuits and in 1801 he published The History and Antiquities of St David's, followed by Sketches of the History and Natural Beauties of Clifton (1802) and A Guide from Clifton to the Counties of Monmouth, Glamorgan ... (1802), all of which were illustrated by engravings from his own drawings. In 1803 Manby wrote a pamphlet entitled An Englishman's Reflexions on the Author of the Present Disturbances, in which he dealt with the threatened invasion of England by Napoleon. This work attracted the notice of Charles Yorke, then secretary of war, and in August of the same year Manby was appointed barrack-master at Great Yarmouth.' (ODNB)

Manby's great love for Clifton is exhibited throughout this work, which includes sketches and maps of Clifton, as well as frequent quotations from Romantic poets to describe the city's beauties. In the dedication of the work he writes: 'When Clifton becomes the object of my choice, I am not insensible of the difficulties of the undertaking; from a knowledge of my own incompetency, and from the scanty materials in my possession to trace the histories of those primitive fortresses, which are left as monuments to perpetuate the renown of their once antient occupiers, who by unanimity, and sentiment of patriotism, could humiliate every nation, render themselves invincible, and fix a lasting impression on posterity' (iii).



Edward Pugh (1763-1813) was a Welsh artist know for his depiction of the scenery of North Wales. This book was published posthumously, and has recently gained new recognition through a biography of Pugh which John Barrell published in 2013. According to Barrell's biography, Pugh's drawings provide the most insight into life in North Wales, since all other contemporary accounts were made by English writers (note the importance placed on Pugh being Welsh in the book's title: he is only referred to as 'a Native Artist'). Barrell's biography also shows how Pugh's landscapes 'reveal a wealth of local knowledge, and the way in which they dramatize some issues of great importance to Wales in his time - the effects of the enclosure of common lands; the effects of the war with France on industry and the condition of the poor; the need to develop and modernize the Welsh economy; the power of the great landowners. A unique insight into life in North Wales in the late 18th and early 19th Century.




Thomas Rowlandson (1757-1827) was an English artist and caricaturist of the Georgian Era, noted for his political satire and social observation. A prolific artist and printmaker, Rowlandson produced both individual social and political satires, as well as large number of illustrations for novels, humorous books, and topographical works. Like other caricaturists of his age such as James Gillray, his caricatures are often robust or bawdy. Rowlandson also produced highly explicit erotica for a private clientele; this was never published publicly at the time and is now only found in a small number of collections. His caricatures included those of people in power such as the Duchess of Devonshire, William Pitt the Younger and Napoleon Bonaparte.

William Combe (1742-1823) was a British miscellaneous writer chiefly remembered as the author of *The Three Tours of Doctor Syntax*, a comic poem, illustrated by artist Thomas Rowlandson's colour plates, that satirised William Gilpin.

\*According to Tooley: "[E]normously popular from the outset Dr. Syntax went into many editions, no less than 2 in 1812, 3 in 1813, others in 1815, 1817, and 2 in 1819". The plates in volume 1 are dated 1815-1819 (the vast majority being dated 1815).



Pierce Egan (1772-1849) published this sprawling satire on London life between 1821 and 1822, which follows its protagonists Bob Tallyho and Tom Dashall's adventures in London. Egan's most popular book was his 1821 Life in London, which similarly followed protagonists Tom and Jerry through their life in London. Egan's works were immensely popular at the time, being reissued countless of times and spanning a series of theatrical adaptations and burlesques. Thackeray, whose own satire of London Vanity Fair (1848) is a landmark of the Victorian novel, remembered Egan's novels fondly from his childhood. Critics have also looked at the influence of Egan's work on Dickens's The Pickwick Papers (1838), which examines life in the capital and boasts and ensemble of characters. Egan, unlike his Victorian successors, has not received much attention in recent decades, but his novels remain a source of endless entertainment and of insight into late-Romantic London.



This fine and uncommon set of four lithographs provide a sweeping 360° panoramic view of Edinburgh and the surrounding areas from Calton Hill. Edinburgh was the birthplace of the panorama – indeed the first panorama ever produced was taken also from Calton Hill, by Robert Barker in 1787, thus setting in train a fashion for this type of topographical painting. In 1822, the artist, Mary Stewart, had produced a set of four views of the city from Blackford Hill. She was the daughter of Sir William Stewart, of Castle Stewart, Wigtownshire, and she married Sir Abraham Elton of Clevedon, Somerset in 1822. The views were drawn on stone by William Westall the skilled topographical illustrator and printed in London by Charles Hullmandel, one of the foremost lithographic printers. Lithography was very much in its infancy in Scotland, the first examples using this method not being printed until 1821. In two of the views can be seen tented encampments of troops, assembled to honour the royal visit of King George IV to the city in August 1822. The panoramas also provide detailed evidence of the development of the city in the early 19th century. (National Library of Scotland)

This copy is an unusual combination of the deluxe hand-coloured issue (with the plates hand-coloured and mounted on separate sheets) and the ordinary plain tinted one. The first title is coloured the second not. Of the 56 full page plates 19 are hand-coloured (deluxe) 14 plain tinted (ordinary) and 23 are plain tinted (as always). Of the 26 vignette illustrations in the text 7 are hand-coloured (deluxe) and 19 are plain tinted (ordinary). The map also bears colour.

The dissolution of the monasteries by Henry VIII in the 16th century left Yorkshire with a rich collection of monastic ruins, captured here in a series of plates by artist William Richardson in a work that rivals the great Holy Land by David Roberts. Locations included here are Whitby Abbey, Kirkstall Abbey, St. Mary's York, Rievaulx and Kirkham Ábbeys, Fountains, Roche Abbey, Byland and Newborough, Guisborough, Mount Grace, Selby Abbey, Bolton Priory, Bridlington Priory, Old Malton Priory, Joraulx Abbey, Sallay Abbey, Sawley Abbey, Monk Bretton Priory, Coverham Abbey, Eggleston Abbey, Easby Abbey, Grey Friars Richmond, Howden, Kirkham Priory, Marrick, Nun-Monkton, Ellerton and Rosedale Priory. The plates were printed by the lithographic firm of William Day, frequently referred to as "Day and Hague" because of the fine work of Belgian draughtsman and watercolorist Louis Haghe, the foremost lithographer of his time. "The firm of Day and Haghe raised lithography to perhaps the highest point it ever attained" (Abbey, 340).




First edition in English of this major work on the history of the missionary experience of the Moravian Brethren among the Indians of Greenland which was originally published in Dutch in 1765, and is here translated by Bishop John Gambold (1711 - 1771). In 1759, David Crantz (or Cranz) (1723–77) was sent to Greenland for a year by the Moravian Church. Writing in German, Crantz published in 1765 his detailed observations on the country, its people and their way of life, including a history of the Moravian mission there. The text is illustrated with several engravings that depict landscapes as well as kayaks, weapons and tools used by the Greenlanders, providing a valuable visual record of eighteenth-century life among the native population. Volume 2 contains an account of Moravian missionary activity in Greenland since 1733, tracing how the Moravians managed to brave the conditions while spreading the Gospel among the people. "The minute journal of the noble Moravian Brethren, gives us in their own language the phases of Aboriginal life and peculiarities which daily presented themselves. No tribe of American savages has been more closely or intelligently studied. Specimens of their language are given" (Field).



The majority of the plates are after J. G Georgi's 4 volume Description de toutes les nations de l'Empire de Russie published in German and French in St Petersburg by Carl Muller in 1776-1780. Georgi's plates were also the basis of William Miller's edition published the same year with 73 plates.

This Harding edition significantly rarer than the Miller and although very similar in content includes a number of different plates, differences of composition and differs in text.






Juan Van Halen (1788-1864) was a Spanish military of-ficer who, after fighting for the losing side in the Peninsular War, was forced to flee to Spain. He subsequently became a military adventurer throughout Europe and went on an 18-month tenure as a colonel in the Russian Caucasus Dragoon Regiment until his removal by Tsar Alexander I of Russia. He fought in the Caucasus campaign in 1820, serving the Armenian prince Valerian Madatov against the troops of Surghai Khan (later replaced by Ashan Khan) in the Kazikoumik region of Daghestan. Despite some likely fictional elements, this account of his adventures is generally regarded as based in truth. British traveller and scholar John Frederick Baddeley describes it as "one of the best of the early books of travel and adventure in the Caucasus" (Russian Conquest of the Caucasus).






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
